TRINITY SUNDAY

Trinity Sunday falls on May 27 this year. Trinity Sunday is celebrated in all the Western liturgical churches: Roman Catholic, Anglican, Lutheran, Presbyterian, United Church of Christ, and Methodist. In the Catholic Church it is officially known as the *Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity*. The Sundays following Pentecost, until Advent, are numbered from this day. In

traditional Catholic usage, the First Sunday After Pentecost is on the same day as Trinity Sunday. In the revised Roman rite, Ordinary Time resumes one week earlier, on the Monday after Pentecost.

SUSAN KIRKWOOD-YATES A Dedicated Life

From generation to generation for 2000 years, women and men have passed on the faith we share. The ministry has been identified by many names: CCD, Religious Education, Catechetical Ministry, and Faith Formation, but the focus has always been to pass on the teachings of this faith and the way of life to which it calls us. For more than 30 years **Susan Kirkwood-Yates** did just that.

When Susan began as an "upcountry" catechist in the early 1980's, classes were held at Pine Grove and Pioneer Elementary schools. Susan worked under the direction of **Sister Brigid** of the Canossian Sisters who were assigned to St. Patrick Parish. As the upcountry community of OLOP grew, classes were moved from the weekday schedule to Sunday mornings in Haran Hall. In 1998

when the Canossian Sisters were reassigned, Sister Brigid recommended Susan be appointed coordinator of classes at OLOP.

In 2002, knowing of her years of experience first as a catechist and then as coordinator, **Fr. Tom Seabridge** appointed

Susan DRE for all St. Patrick Parish. She was now responsible for weekday classes at St. Patrick, Sunday classes at OLOP, and for Junior High. As well as preparation for First Eucharist and Confirmation. When the Churches of Amador County were brought together as St. Katharine Drexel, Susan was appointed DRE by **Fr. Larry**.

From the beginning of her time as DRE Susan developed and implemented a comprehensive plan for the overall development of Faith Formation. Simply giving the catechists a Teacher's Manual, a calendar and a class list was not Susan's way. She introduced monthly catechist meetings. Grounded in prayer the meetings provided spiritual and practical support for catechists. The monthly meetings offered the opportunity to help with lesson planning and introduce the catechists to creative ways to enrich their lessons from ways to pray with the children, to stories that might fit a lesson, to review games.

A series of outreach projects helped the children to understand that what they learned in class had to be lived out in daily life. Collecting socks, hats and mittens for the homeless, filling Birthday Bags, making cookies for *Break Bread with Friends* are only a few of the ways the children lived out their faith.

Susan also developed and implemented an 8-session sacramental preparation for both First Eucharist and Confirmation. These brought parents and their children or youth together for learning, faith sharing and prayer.

Seasonal Family Gatherings were added to the regular weekly classes again with a view to providing opportunities for parent and child to share their faith and for families to interact with one another.

Behind the scenes were hours of planning, registration forms to keep track of, Diocesan guidelines to follow, Liturgies for First Eucharist and Confirmation to plan, and a myriad of other details to attend to so everything went smoothly.

I worked with Susan for 17 years. What I have shared are only a few highlights of what Susan has brought to this ministry. Susan's faith is the rock upon which she stands. Her faith is at the heart of of everything she has given to this ministry. With gentleness and kindness; with faithfulness

and perseverance; with joy and generosity; with creativity and practicality Susan has been a gift to this faith community for over 30 years.



Fifteen years ago, our parish put on a Ministry Faire called *Time, Talent, Treasure.* The choir, naturally, had a booth. There was one signup for choir, unseen by any choir there. It said, 'Will join you at completion of radiation in March.' And yes, it was our beloved **Dan Sooy**. He and **Carole** moved to Pine Grove in 2002 and, by the end of 2003, Dan was in our choir. He was so faithful and punctual. He loved to tease and dish it out to two ladies who were not always so punctual (**Barbara Finetti** and **Geri Wuelfing**).

Dan had such a pleasant voice and did love to sing. He especially loved the hymns that allowed him to stand tall and sing with full volume, like *How Great Thou Art, America the Beautiful, Blest Be the Lord.*

How he loved to tease! No one was left out. He delighted in joshing the choir director when she had the 'ladies only' sing, and often threatened to turn her into the union for 'discrimination'!

At one time in Haran Hall, the piano was against the wall, and the director had her back to the choir. How Dan, **Joe Bailey**, and **Jack Magee** loved to joke and cutup. The director reminded them she had taught 7th and 8th grade boys for 25 years and was familiar with their antics. This earned her the Dan-originated title of 'The Choirmistress' which she uses to this day.

Choir was only a start for Dan in service. He became a sacristan and served at weekday Masses. He also served a full term on the Parish Finance Council, and was treasurer for the Our Lady of the Pines Society.

Then came the Rummage Sale. Dan handled all the money for several years. He was also in charge of 'furniture' and was commonly seen 'testing out' sofas and easy chairs with a short snooze.

Dan and Carole hosted the annual choir party in their home for many years and

were welcoming and generous hosts.

There is an empty chair in the back row of the choir, and there is a big empty hole in the hearts of all the choir for our Darlin' Dan.

Editor's note: A funeral Mass for Dan will be celebrated on Saturday, May 12, 11 AM, at Our Lady of the Pines, followed by a reception in Haran Hall. One of Dan's last requests was that we dress not in dark colors but in bright hues in celebration of his life!

EATING AT JOAN'S HOUSE

The deli in most stores is a wealth of convenience to the modern cook. I shop WinCo, and their deli has shredded chicken, grilled chicken, Orange Chicken and much more. Safeway in Martell may have it in the deli – if not, check their frozen foods. If you're looking for a meat for an entrée salad or quick stir-fry, ask the meat counter person to cut you a ½-inch or so slice. Dinner is then only minutes away.

Need a sauce for stir-frys that isn't too strong tasting?? Use cooking sherry to dilute it.

ORANGE CHICKEN QUICKIE

serves 4

Prepare veggies --- cut on the slant: 2 cups celery, 2 cups mini colored peppers, $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups zucchini, $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups onion, cut into 1×1 pieces.

Cut cooked Orange Chicken into bite-size pieces.

Place all above into a large non-stick fry pan or wok. With 2 spoons stir and lift until chicken is heated thru. Veggies will be crunchy tender.

Add cooking sherry and Kikkoman Orange Sauce to taste.

Serve with your favorite rice -- mine is brown Basmati, Ray Waugh's is traditional sticky rice.

- ✓ Early Bird Donations accepted at Haran Hall, weekdays May 1-13, 12 noon to 2 PM, and briefly after Sunday Mass.
- ✓ **Donations** continue to be accepted at Haran Hall, weekdays, beginning Tuesday May 15 through Friday June 1, 9 AM to 2:30 PM, and briefly after Sunday Mass.
- ✓ Rummage Sale Setup will be weekdays beginning Tuesday May 15, through Wednesday June 6, 9 AM to 2:30 PM.
- ✓ Rummage Sale: Thursday-Friday-Saturday, June 7-8-9, 9 AM 4 PM (Saturday hours to be confirmed).
- ✓ Cleanup: Monday-Tuesday-Wednesday, June 11-12-13.

We gratefully accept most items with the exception of: mattresses, sofabeds, infant cribs/carriers and infant/child car seats, tires, hazardous materials including open cans of paints/stains/thinners. We also do not accept televisions (unless the newer, flatscreen type), old computers and printers, CRT monitors. Acceptance of large appliances and entertainment centers will be at the discretion of the rummage sale managers (managers change each week of the setup).

We need plenty of helping hands during the setup (see dates above) - receiving, sorting, cleaning, displaying. If you have a pickup truck and can help with occasional donation pickups, we need you. If you signed up to help, just show up any time during the setup hours -- don't wait for a phone call! During the sale itself, we still need volunteers to help sell, keep the displays
