THE UPCOUNTRY'S BIGGEST ANNUAL RUMMAGE SALE

Question: What do mirrors, mantels, and mermaid tails have in common? Answer: You could have found any one of them at this year's annual rummage sale! As always, we were blessed with an abundance and a wide array of donated items to attract and delight the hundreds of shoppers who found their way to Haran Hall in early June. Our 'regular shoppers' were ready and waiting for the Thursday morning opening. Sales were brisk right off the bat and ebbed and flowed throughout the three days. The last day finished strong with our usual '\$3 a bag or ½ off' on most items. We grossed \$10,700 – another remarkable accomplishment! Proceeds are used to fund the needs of the Our Lady of the Pines Society, primarily maintenance, charitable, and our scholarship program.

Several large, flat-screen TVs were donated this year, and the Society in turn donated one to The Arc of Amador and

Calaveras for use at one of its facilities. The Arc provides services and support to people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. As others have shared their bounty with us, we are privileged to share with others.

Sincere thanks are offered to all who donated in some way to this year's sale. The people who gave us everything from hand-me-downs to treasures. The faithful volunteers who gave so much of their time over six weeks of preparation, the sale, AND the cleanup. The cookie bakers. The local grocery stores who donated food and money to support the rummage sale snack bar. The shoppers who patronize the sale each year. And, lastly, the Knights of Columbus who agreed to take our leftovers! Everyone who works the sale knows it is truly a labor of love, and the camaraderie is always enjoyable and lasting. From setup to cleanup, we counted 52 volunteers who gave of their time as they were able, for a total of 2,107 hours worked. These numbers are down a bit from the last few years, which is a testament to the efficiency of this year's workers! The day-to-day coordination was handled with teams of 'weekly managers' – this shared the burden of chairing the sale among nine volunteers. And there was a steady crew of about 20 people who worked faithfully and tirelessly to make *The Upcountry's Biggest Annual Rummage Sale* an event whose reputation precedes itself!

"THINGAMAJIGS" AND "WHATCHAMACALLITS"

Expanding Your Liturgical
Vocabulary

A chef knows the names of specific utensils and a carpenter the names of particular tools which are significant to their work. Within and surrounding the Eucharistic Liturgy, which is our "work" as worshipping Catholics, we also have significant tools and objects. Liturgical words are not necessarily part of a person's everyday vocabulary. Many do not roll off the tongue easily. This can make them difficult to remember. That's when we resort to, "Oh, you know that sprinkler thingamajig." or "You know the whatchamacallit symbol when the X is on the P."

Here's the vocabulary challenge.

Read the following list of words. How many can you define? Check your answers.

Ambo - Credence Table - Thurible -Ambry - Purificator - Aspergillum -Paten - Aspersorium - Corporal -Lectionary - Chasuble - Chi-Ro -Narthex - Nave

Ambo: the place where the Scriptures are read at Mass

Credence Table: the table in the sanctuary that holds vessels used for Mass

Thurible: the vessel that holds the burning coals and incense

Ambry: the cabinet that holds the holy oils

Purificator: the "napkin" used by Eucharistic ministers to wipe the cup

Aspergillum: the instrument used to sprinkle holy water

Paten: the plate that holds the large host **Aspersorium:** the bowl or bucket that holds the holy water used in sprinkling

Corporal: a small "table cloth" spread on the altar under the bread and wine

Lectionary: contains the first and second readings proclaimed by the Lectors

Chasuble: priest's outer robe in the liturgical color of the season or occasion

Chi-Ro: the P and X symbol for Christ **Narthex:** the entrance to the church

Nave: the body of the church

MEMORIAL OF SAINTS JOACHIM AND ANNE, PARENTS OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

July 26 is the Memorial of Saints Joachim and Anne. Saints Joachim (sometimes spelled "Joaquin," pronounced "walkeem") and Anne, are the parents of the Virgin Mary. There are no mentions of them in the Bible or Gospels, what we know comes from Catholic legend and the Gospel of James, which is an unsanctioned, apocryphal writing from the second century AD. We do know from scholarship that the Gospel of James was not written by James, the Brother of Jesus, despite its claim to be so authored.

Even the early Church fathers expressed skepticism about the Gospel of James in their writings. There are about 150 copies of the ancient manuscript which often have different titles, but tell the same story, that Mary was promised to Joachim and Anne by an angel, was consecrated to God, and she remained a virgin all her life.

Naturally, there is plenty of room for scholarly debate about these saints. We have no true primary sources that prove they even existed, but certainly we can agree that Mary had parents.

Mary had good, faithful parents who raised her with a love and devotion to God like none other except Jesus Christ Himself.

Joachim and Anne serve as role models for parents and both deserve to be honored and emulated for their devotion to God and Our Lady Mary, the Mother of God.

EATING AT JOAN'S HOUSE

Antipasto Pasta

Serves 6

Up to 5 days before

In a large pot bring water to boiling and add linguine (9 oz). Bring back to boil, turn to simmer for 1 minute, drain, cool down with cold water. Reserve ½ cup cooking liquid. After draining, place in Ziploc with 2 tablespoons olive oil and 1 clove garlic, chopped. Smush from outside to mix oil and garlic with pasta. Refrigerate pasta and reserved liquid.

Day of serving

Put reserved cooking liquid in a large pot.

ADD: 2 cups Portobello or Crimini (baby bells) mushrooms, sliced ¼ inch thick.

On medium heat, cook and stir until mushrooms are tender, about 3 minutes.

ADD: 6 oz sliced hard salami, cut into thin strips.

Cook and stir with the mushrooms for 2 minutes.

ADD: 1½ cups Mezzetta brand Italian Mix Giardiniera vegetables, sliced, plus:

- ¾ cup marinade
- 1 cup jar roasted red peppers, sliced
- 1½ cups medium black or kalamata olives
- pasta
- 1 ½ cups fresh basil, chopped
- salt and pepper

Lift and mix thoroughly with 2 large spoons.

ADD: 1½ cups Asiago cheese. Remove from heat. Lift and stir until thoroughly mixed and cheese starts to melt.

ADD: ¼ cup olive oil. Mix thoroughly.

Prepare ½ cup basil, chopped and ½ cup Asiago cheese.

Garnish each serving with basil and cheese.
