THANKSGIVING DAY

Thanksgiving is celebrated on the fourth Thursday of November. It originated as a harvest festival, and to this day the centerpiece of Thanksgiving celebrations remains Thanksgiving dinner. The dinner traditionally consists of foods and dishes indigenous to the Americas, namely turkey, potatoes (usually mashed), stuffing, squash, corn (maize), green beans, cranberries (typically in sauce form), and pumpkin pie.

The event that Americans commonly call the "First Thanksgiving" was celebrated by the Pilgrims after their first harvest in the New World in October 1621. This feast lasted three days, and, as recounted by attendee Edward Winslow, was attended by 90 Native Americans and 53 Pilgrims (49 out of 102 pilgrims had died that first winter of 1620/1621).

Thanksgiving has been celebrated nationally on and off since 1789, with a proclamation by President George Washington after a request by Congress. President Thomas Jefferson chose not to observe the holiday, and its celebration was intermittent until President Abraham Lincoln, in 1863, proclaimed a national day of "Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in

the Heavens," to be celebrated on the last Thursday in November.

CHURCHES OF EUROPE

Holy House of Mary, Loreto, Italy. We have taken three groups of fellow travelers to this pilgrim destination.





Archaeological scientists confirmed that this is Mary's Nazareth house where the Angel Gabriel came to her in the Annunciation. Because there are only three walls and no foundation, they were able to compare dimensions of the foundation and wall material to the foundation and one wall that still remain in Nazareth. Many popes and saints have visited Mary's House, most recently Pope Francis, John Paul and Benedict and many saints, to name a few, St. Francis, St. Louis de Montfort, and St. Terese, Little Flower. These popes and saints attribute the move to **angelic action**. All the popes believed this was a supernatural event and recognized the documents as historical science. Basilica Santa Casa (Basilica of the Holy House) was built around Mary's House to protect it.

Now for a little church that's very special to me. In my grandfather's village, in Lalling/Ranzing, Bavaria, is this little church




surrounded by the graveyard, which is typical of churches in Europe. Every morning the caretaker goes grave to grave and lights the little lantern that is at each gravesite and makes sure that there are fresh flowers in the vase. The church of silver and gold was built in the year 1000 and my grandfather was baptized here in 1873; Ludwig II was King of Bavaria when both my grandparents were born. A very unique custom is that there is a book at the altar that has all the names of people who have died and it is open each day to the date so you can come into the church and pray for those who died that day. My cousin just retired from being the Burgermeister (mayor), in this village, for 30 years; his grandfather and mine were brothers. We rarely miss a visit when we are in Europe.
