OCTOBER: THE MONTH OF THE ROSARY

The Catholic Church dedicates each month of the year to a certain devotion, and the month of October is dedicated to the Holy Rosary. This is primarily because the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary is celebrated each year on October 7th. One of the best ways to celebrate this month is, of course, to daily pray the Rosary.

When we were living in Naples, Italy, from 2016 to 2019, we had the opportunity to pray the Rosary during the month of the Holy Rosary (October) at and with the Parishioners of the Pontifical Shrine of the Virgin of the Rosary in Pompei. The Shrine was restored by Blessed Bartolo Longo in the main square of Pompei from 1873 to 1883. Blessed Bartolo raised funds for the restoration of the church in part

by asking the local residents for the equivalent of one penny apiece and by spreading Rosary devotions and holding Rosary festivals.

On the high altar of the Shrine, there is a venerated painting depicting the Virgin Mary and Child Jesus presenting Rosaries to Saint Dominic and Saint Catherine of

Siena (see photo). This painting arrived to Pompei on its back in a wagon of manure, having been brought all the way from convent in Naples (approximately 25 km - which is a long trip by foot or horseback), and required much loving restoration.

The halls of the narthex and museum within the Shrine are covered with photographs, cards, and letters of thanksgiving for miracles of health, fertility, and recovery attributed to Our Lady of the Rosary and Rosary Novenas. Perhaps the most famous of the many verified miracles at the Shrine is that of Fortuna Agrelli, a young girl whose health was fully restored from three incurable diseases after she and her family prayed three Rosary Novenas in petition, followed by three Rosary Novenas in thanksgiving. 
To what? By whom? Where? When?

REMEMBERING MIKE MADDEN

Less than two years ago, we lost parishioner Betty Madden. Following all too soon, her husband Mike Madden went home to the Lord in June of this year. Mike had moved to the Bay Area to be near family, and his final months were spent at The Kensington senior living community in Walnut Creek.

Mike was born in 1932 in Ironton, Ohio. Small but mighty, he was a standout football player at St. Joseph High School in Ironton before being drafted into the Army in 1953. He was stationed in Fairbanks, Alaska. After his military service, Mike returned to Ironton where he met his soon-to-be wife, Betty Jo Waugh. After marrying in 1955, the Maddens were blessed with two sons, Terence and Michael. The family moved to California in 1962, eventually settling in Contra Costa County.

Most of Mike's career was spent as a life insurance agent for Northwestern Mutual, a profession at which he excelled. He earned his pilot's license and flew often with family and friends, enjoying this hobby throughout his life. He was a long-time member of both the Elks Club and the Lions Club. Upon the Maddens' retirement to Pioneer in 1998. they led an active life, enjoying RV travel around the country. Two of Mike's passions were fly-fishing and making wine from his estate grapes. Mike and Betty were stalwart parishioners at Our Lady of the Pines, drawing smiles and conversation from this faith community.


Mike leaves behind a sister, his two sons, three grandchildren, and a greatgrandchild. Rest in peace, Mike. We shall miss you.

REMEMBERING TONY ALIMONTI

Tony Alimonti was born in Albany, California, of parents that immigrated from the Abruzzo Region of Italy. He was born with a love of adventure and at the age of 16, he left school and joined the Merchant Marines and sailed on Standard Oil tankers with ports in Alaska, Hawaii and South America. Getting his draft notice at 18, he joined the Navy in 1947 and for nine years, he sailed the seven seas to five continents and during the Korea conflict his ship operated off the coast of Korea.

Tony had three boys from a previous marriage. After the Navy, he had various jobs until his career was the finance business, managing several offices in the Bay Area. Over the years, he also had several boats in the California Delta.

Tony met **Joan** and they married in 1974, moved to the Delta, where they lived for 11 years, 7 of those on their 43 foot house cruiser. Buying property in Amador Pines they became very involved in the newly built Our Lady of the Pines, considering it still to be their church. Adventure was always calling and in retirement they traveled the U.S. in their RV and Europe 20 times.

Tony leaves behind his wife, two sons, three grandchildren and four great-granddaughters.

CHURCHES OF EUROPE

Part 3

We saw these churches for the first time as we journeyed through the beautiful French valley of Loire noted for its chateaux, with granddaughter-in-law Corry and great-granddaughter, Korissa, in tow in July 2021.




The charming old town of **Chartres** is crowned by the UNESCO-listed **Cathédrale Notre-Dame de Chartres**, an important pilgrimage destination during the Middle Ages. This aweinspiring French Gothic church stands in an elevated position, with its soaring spires visible from

a distance. Built in the 12^{th} and 13^{th} centuries, Chartres Cathedral is one of the finest and best-preserved medieval churches in France as well as an important landmark of Christian art and architecture.

Bourges. The town's top attraction, the UNESCO-listed


Cathédrale Saint -Etienne ranks among the most splendid of French cathedrals built in the 12th and 13th centuries.



The ornate west front, flanked by massive towers, has five doorways with rich sculptural decoration and an exquisite 14^{th} -century rose window. The cathedral is entered through the Romanesque south doorway, over which is a figure of Christ in Majesty, surrounded by the symbols of the four Evangelists. The interior stuns visitors with its gorgeous sanctuary illuminated by 13^{th} -century stained-glass windows.

Orléans — Basilique Cathédrale Sainte-Croix d'Orléans. The Cathedral was originally built from 1278 to 1329. It was partially destroyed in 1568 by the Huguenots during the French Wars of Religion, but was rebuilt between 1601 and 1829. The edifice is in the Gothic architectural style. During the Siege of Orléans, the cathedral was visited frequently by Joan of Arc. The cathedral's stained glass windows now depict the story of Joan's actions that contributed to the lifting of the siege. The largest town in the Loire Valley after Tours, Orléans is inseparably bound with the history of Joan of Arc. The city owes its survival to the 17-year-old "Maid of Orléans," who helped lead the French to victory against the English when Orléans was besieged in 1429.
