APOSTLE TO THE APOSTLES



July 22 is the **Feast of Saint Mary Magdalene**. She is the patron saint of contemplative life, converts, hairstylists, penitents, perfume makers, and women.

Mary of Magdala has long been regarded as a prostitute or sexually immoral in western Christianity, but this is not supported in the scriptures. It is believed she was a Jewish

woman who lived among Gentiles, living as they did.

The Gospels agree that Mary was originally a great sinner. Jesus cast seven demons out of her when he met her. After this, she told several women she associated with, and these women also became followers.

There is also debate over if Mary Magdalene is the same unnamed women, a sinner, who weeps and washes Jesus' feet with her hair in the Gospel of John. Scholars are skeptical this is the same person.

Despite the scholarly dispute over her background, what she did in her subsequent life, after meeting Jesus, is much more significant. She was certainly a sinner whom Jesus saved, giving us an example of how no person is beyond the saving grace of God.

Rough Road Ahead



The Council brothers continue to reaffirm our commitment to continue as a YMI Council and a social and spiritual outlet for the men of Our Lady

of the Pines.

The Council was hoping for a Sunday Mass again at OLOP when things got back to normal. The recently announced Mass schedule and the continued lack of a Sunday Mass at OLOP will mean a rough road ahead for Our Lady of the Pines YMI Council #137.

In late 2008 our pastor, Father Tom Seabridge, gave permission to form a men's club at OLOP. At that time up to 200 persons attended the 9:30 AM Sunday Mass at Our Lady of the Pines every week. Many of our Mass attendees were older and were not inclined to drive to Jackson, especially at night. The Men's Club is affiliated with the Young Men's Institute, which is a large Catholic fraternal organization. A promise was made to Father Tom that membership would be aimed primarily at men attending OLOP so as not to interfere with other groups in the parish. The Our Lady of the Pines YMI Council was officially installed in early January of 2009.

Since the consolidation of the former three parishes in Amador County, recruitment of members has been difficult. A change in the Sunday Mass time to 11:30 AM saw a reduction of Mass attendance to 90 persons or fewer. We are now entering an era where there will be no Sunday Mass at all in Amador's Upcountry. However, the YMI Council #137 will continue to serve the Catholic Men of our area for as long as possible.

A future fundraiser in the form of a

"special" raffle is still in the works. Be ready for future announcements.

The Brothers of YMI #137 again placed the large flags at Pioneer Cemetery on Memorial Day, May 31st. It was an honor to do this.

Our meeting night is the fourth Wednesday of the month at 5:30 PM in Haran Hall. All men of the parish are welcome to come and enjoy the fellowship of our monthly dinner and short business meeting.

The main purpose of our council is to give the Catholic men of OLOP and the surrounding area the opportunity to get together, strengthen their faith, have fellowship, and help our parish and community. We hope to see our fellow Catholic men and future brothers at our next meeting.

The Young Men's Institute was founded in 1883, and Our Lady of the Pines Council #137 is proud to be a part of this national organization.

COME TO MEJacqueline Henss

Recently I have been re-reading a book by Benedictine sister, Joan Ridley, called *In the Presence, the Spirituality of Eucharistic Adoration*. It seemed to me that others would also enjoy knowing a bit of the history of our present day practice of adoration.

As early as the first century after Christ, the hermits and solitaries "began to venerate and pray to the Lord in the Sacrament."

In the fourth and fifth centuries, Saints John Chrysostom and Augustine argued that if the Eucharist is truly the full, real presence of Jesus Christ, and Christ is God, the sacrament deserves the same adoration as we give to God.

The feast and procession of Corpus Christi, which we just recently participated in at St. Katharine's originated in Belgium in the early 1200's. Perpetual adoration also came about at this time, and involved all the churches in a diocese with each having exposition on specific days. Thus, each contributed to a 24-hour/7-days-a-week pattern of perpetual adoration.

The practice of "Forty Hours" began in Italy about 1527, with the Blessed Sacrament being taken from church to church in the area with each, as above, contributing a block of hours.

Over many years, the Church, enlightened by the Holy Spirit of God has gradually welcomed the fullness of God's intent of the Eucharistic Presence in our lives. Pope Benedict wrote, "To receive Christ means: to move toward Him, to adore Him. For this reason, the reception of Holy Communion can stretch out beyond the time of the Eucharistic celebration; indeed, it has to." And in the Catechism of the Catholic Church we read, "Adoration complements and deepens the effects of Eucharist in those who adore."

My 300 word limit allows for just a few facts and without the so-very-interesting details. I will be so happy to lend the 80-page book to anyone who asks.

Editor's Note: Our Lady of the Pines now has a Holy Hour of Adoration on the 3rd Wednesday of the month, at 10:30 AM, just prior to the 11:30 Mass. (Exception: No Holy Hour in July due to Father's vacation.)
